Letter from the Secretary & Founder

On behalf of Training Awareness about Health and Rehabilitation Society (TAABAR) (<u>www.taabar.org</u>), it is indeed my privilege to present this annual report of TAABAR ending March 31, 2022.

The year 2021 witnessed several glorious and gloomy moments. From achieving the distant goal of COVID vaccination to scripting history in the Olympics. More than a year after the onset of the pandemic, in April the country saw the pandemic taking an ugly turn, something that was unpredictable. Even as the government was making efforts to scale up vaccination, the country started recording more than 4 lakh active cases and 40,000 deaths daily. This came as a huge setback for the country because up until that point, with the rollout of COVID vaccines and its administration, a sigh of relief was expected. Instead, the cases started spiraling.

The scrod wave of COVID-19 badly affected children, unfortunately hundreds of children lost either both parents and single parents. Their world had changed and they didn't even know it. They couldn't understand why their parents were taking so long to come home. In fact, this pandemic has made children vulnerable to trafficking, trauma and abuse. The COVID-19 pandemic, which has devastated families across India, has left thousands of children orphaned or without one parent. According to RSCPCR the list of more than 1500 such children was prepared in Rajasthan. District Child Protection Units in each district were preparing the list of such children and efforts were being put to link these children with ongoing government schemes but there were so many formalities until immediate relief was being provided by the NGOs who are working for children.

TAABAR, as a helping hand prepared a response mechanism and provided immediate help to needy people and children. TAABAR provided support to such children in collaboration with District Child Protection Unit as following

- 1. Educational support to the children
- 2. Ration support
- 3. Clothing, toiletries etc.
- 4. Health care (Health and hygiene, covid care and test, medicines)
- 5. Psycho social support

During the pandemic it was a tough time for child care institutions from financial crisis to human resource crisis. We managed with minimum resources with the help of our donors and supporters. Team affected with COVID but by God grace no casualty happened with children and the entire team of TAABAR. We followed all the protocols to keep safe and secure our children and team members and took care of them when needed medical help

On behalf of TAABAR I am thankful to our donors Paul Hamlyn foundation, Azeem Premji philanthropy initiative (APPI) etc.



Bal Basera Open Shelter Home

Since 2006, 4648 children have been accommodated from various background such as runaway, missing, street children, beggars, child laborers etc. Of which 3173 children have been restored and 1441 children has been repatriated, transferred or referred in long term care, presently 31 children are staying in open shelters home.

Presently 25 children are staying in long term care:

A brief back ground of the children who are living in CCI: -

- 1. Single parent, as one parent is either died or suffering from non-curable disease
- 2. Children of prisoners
- 3. Incapacitated parents
- 4. Runaway
- 5. Missing
- 6. Children without parents
- 7. Affected with HIV/AIDS

We facilitate our children with cognitive, social and emotional developments. A good amount of time is being invested by our trained staff and experts to attain these goals. Section 53 of the JJ Act provides for several rehabilitation and re-integration services such as education, vocational training, mental health interventions, counselling etc. We abide by the law and follow the JJ Act (CNCP) 2015 in its true sense.

Bal Basera kitchen is providing food to the children as per the Juvenile Justice Act-2015. This includes breakfast, lunch, refreshment and dinner.

Children eat meals together before going to start they always do a quick prayer. Prayer before food teaches children to respect every single piece of food. A prayer before food has a lot of benefits. We all know food is the basic necessity of life. It contains all nutrients to sustain a healthy living. It gives us energy to perform our daily tasks, repair our tissues and protects us from diseases. Besides physical aspects, our favorite food gives us mental satisfaction too.





Theatre

Bal-Basera children are learning theatre skills by a professional artist because role play is what children actually engage in while performing a character. Learning how to wear the mask of the character and performing in front of the audience helps in building self-confidence. Children explore artistic expression of themselves, they deep dive into their and friends' characters and think of various ways to bring it alive. The games that played in these classes ignite those imaginations and make a child more creative in life.

Covid 19-Response

COVID-19 Second Wave

The second wave of COVID-19 in India has had severe consequences in the form spiraling cases, reduced supplies of essential treatments and increased deaths particularly in the young population. Second wave has been more dangerous than the first.

Studies have identified various circulating double mutant and triple mutant strains across different regions of India, which are more pathogenic than the initial strains.

During the second wave in India, many cases of Mucormycosis, also known as the black fungus, have been reported in patients with diabetes and patients with COVID-19, as well as patients who were recovering from infection.

Many children were orphaned during the second wave of the pandemic and this made their life more difficult. Poor financial condition will force them to work for long hours. Children are more vulnerable in this pathetic condition as many of them are struggling for the daily meals, educational support, medicine etc.

Post Rescue Care & Rehabilitation of Child Laborer

The city of Jaipur in Rajasthan, India is a hub for the production of jewelry—especially bangles and intricate textiles. Although child labor is restricted in India, currently, many of these products are rendered by children working illegally in dangerous conditions. Jaipur city is known for its heritage, gallantry, and pink city, it is a matter of luck for Jaipur city that it is also known for child labor, it is a stain in the beauty of this city. Other in Jaipur city Child laborers brought from the states are made to make bangles in inhuman conditions. However, recent government strategies may be turning the tide in combating child labor in Jaipur.

Mobile Clinic Van for Women and Girls

The pandemic has devastating impact on women and girls' health, confinement increased the chances of their exploitation, abuse and poor health. In the slum areas and semi urban areas menstrual health and hygiene was badly affected. Economic disruptions led to women and girls losing access to hygiene products. Ovid -19 has impacted the sanitary pads supply and distribution among adolescent girls and women in all over India.

Despite the absolute necessity, not everyone can afford sanitary pads, and it is a ubiquitous problem, also known as 'period poverty' which becomes even more severe in emergency and humanitarian contexts. COVID.19 induced lockdowns, similar to other emergencies/humanitarian crises, have led to many issues for those who menstruate as periods do not stop during a pandemic, yet managing them becomes problematic. The pandemic has seen girls and women resorting to using socks and old newspapers during menstruation times as sanitary items became either expensive or harder to procure. The ongoing economic crisis resulting from the pandemic has put many girls and women into period poverty, thus

posing multiple health risks, including RTIs, UTIs, and others (PLAN International, 2020). Around 20% of the girls and women surveyed in the PLAN International Report reported an increase in the price of sanitary items. The same survey also reveals a limited supply of sanitary items due to COVID 19 lockdowns and the closure of state borders across 30 countries. TAABAR take up the issues immediately and supplied sanitary pad by purchasing from market but when supply was short in such case TAABAR started making sanitary pads through its vocational training center. No of pads were made and distributed who helped in providing arterial

TAABAR also started a gyno mobile van to take up the health issues of women and girls during the unpresented time of COVID-19

Case Study

Mobile clinic van team was working in community. A woman came and shared about her health issues with mobile clinic van counsellor. After the counselling session she had medical consultation with doctor during the consultation she said, she has white

discharge problem from last few months and she has visited few clinics for the treatment but it didn't work.

As she said, one of her friends suggested her about the mobile clinic van for the treatment. Mobile clinic van doctor gave her free of



cost medicines after the consultation and tell her for the follow up after a week. She took medicines as per the consultation and came again. This time she was happy because her white discharge problem has been solved and now, she is feeling better. She said thanks to all mobile clinic van staff for support provided to her.





Psycho Social Support

TAABAR is providing psycho social support to the children at three stages to the child labors. As the children are rescued, they are brought at the child friendly center that has been established at Shastri Nagar Police station. **At this first stage**, TAABAR fulfill their immediate basic needs (food, water, clothing) and provides psycho social first aid just to make them relax and comfortable with polices and other members of rescue team. They are explained that they are safe here. Counsellors use various activities to make them open up or to tell the true story. The information provided by the children at this stage is very important to lodge or write a strong FIR. Various psycho social activities and games make them comfortable to interact with police.

The second stage of psycho social support is imitated after the admission of the children in CCI. Various activities and counseling are done to heal the trauma of trafficking, rescuing and entering into transitional judicial system. At the third stage children are offered direct support and/or counselling before, during and after statement-taking and testimony; setting up long-term support mechanisms and creating a protective environment for children. This enables the case strong and chances are much more for convictions otherwise most of the cases get acquittal due to lack of proper information, evidences, investigation process and weak FIR and charge sheet. Children get hostile without psycho social support because they are threatened or trained in such a way by the employer that they give false or incorrect information due to fear.











Mobile Clinic Van

Mobile Clinic Van distributed medicines in slums, provided healthcare with counselling services and conducted health awareness sessions in community. Various health awareness sessions were taken by the medical team in which COVID-19, Dental Problems, Nutritious diet, Hand wash, prevention of dengue and malaria were in the main highlight. Medical team educated children about health and hygiene, conducted door-to-door health awareness sessions in community. Medical team not only had taken health awareness sessions, also encouraged people in community for the vaccination.


Health Awareness

Medical team is actively conducting health awareness sessions in community and reaching to marginalized, vulnerable communities. Medical team give enough time to beneficiaries for the open discussion about the given information that helps them to clarify their doubts about the diseases and their treatments.

People are still not reaching to the vaccination centers for COVID-19 dose-2 as vaccines are available for everyone in the hospitals but due to lack of information among vulnerable population avoiding the second dose of vaccination. Mobile clinic van team is encouraging people and conducting awareness sessions in community to leave no one behind.

Repatriation & Restoration

All rescued child labourers from the Jaipur city were sent to their home in Bihar by train on 17-09-2021. District Child Protection Officer Mr. Rohit Jain formed a team of social workers from the NGOs working in Jaipur to send them Bihar with children. 7 guards were also sent with the team to ensure the safety of children during the travel. Taabar played a key role in booking the tickets, arranged food, water, and medicines for the children for their travel from Jaipur to Patna. Taabar assisted other shelter homes in opening bank account, file submission for compensation in DLSA and department of labour, documentation to strengthen the restoration process of rescued child labourers. Mr. Jinesh was nominated in the team formed by the DCPU and went to Bihar with children. Total 43 children were sent from all different NGOs (open shelter homes) Taabar, Naya Sawera, Bal Ashram and JKSMS of Jaipur city.

Bal Basera restored total 6 children during January to February 2022. In which, 3 children were child labour and 3 children were runaway. Families were counselled by the Bal Basera team to ensure the safety of children when they are at home. Parents were also informed about the learning of children in Bal Basera especially educational, theatre and art & craft.

Mobile Library Van




There are many nomadic and tribes or traditional castes (Snake Charmers, Banjaras, Nats etc.) who are still living in miserable conditions. They are isolated and deprived from rights. Jaipur, being the capital of Rajasthan state accommodates number of migrants across the country that faces problems in setting up their lives. TAABAR is striving for bringing them into main stream society by focusing on education of their children through Mobile Library Van visits eight locations on a weekly basis.

A teacher travels with mobile library to teach the basic academic concepts to children. The teacher evaluates each child's academic level and accordingly, suggests a plan. Also, the mobile library is not only restricted to book reading activity. It also conducts other activities including storytelling competition, Life skills and games, art and craft, theatre, festival celebrations. Mobile library van not only address the educational need of children but also cater the quest of youth who are somehow not able to purchase expensive books to continue their studies and fight competitions to get the job.

Child Participation

To ensure child participation in shelter home and children home's activities they shoulder up the responsibility of taking care of cleanliness and hygiene, They learn growing vegetables for their own kitchen, Children committees have been formed to ensure the participation of children in management of the shelter/children home. During the COVID time they took charge to keep safe their home. Children prepared posters and pasted on specific places in Bal Basera children home and ensured that everyone is using the mask and following the COVID-19 guideline. Teachers assisted children in making these posters and provided a platform to organize a group discussion session for children. Children actively participated in group discussion and shared their views about the health safety during the COVID-19 pandemic especially for the upcoming corona virus third wave. Children discussed about hand wash before and after eating food, use of mask, cleaning, physical distancing, benefits of online education, upcoming events etc. Group discussions help children in sharing their views and learning how to speak in group. Group discussion is enhancing communication skills among children. Routine health check-up and counselling was provided to the children by the TAABAR mobile medical team. Healthcare services are improving health and raising awareness among children for the good health. One child has been referred by the doctor for the ear treatment.

Children's Committee

Day Cum Health Care Center

With the aim of educational empowerment and health upliftment, TAABAR is running day cum health care centers for the children who are non-school going, drop out, neglected and slum children. The Project focuses on the educational, Health and Social well-being of slum and rural children by ensuring quality of education, creating protecting environment and providing health facilities.

Around 1400 hundred children are being nurtured through Day cum Health Care Centers. At present five centers are operational in slums of Khor, Kagdiwada and Jhalana in the Jaipur city and two in adjacent Luniyawas village and one center is being operated for the children of isolated communities that includes tribes, nomadic, scheduled castes etc.

Isolated Communities

Around 200 children of deprived communities and marginalized communities (Snake Charmers, nomadic tribes and migrants) are being catered and nurtured by providing various services that are necessary to ensure their holistic growth and development. However, education is a fundamental and constitutional right but due to adverse geographic conditions, poverty, lack of mainstreaming hundreds of children is still deprived from educational rights in Jaipur city. Besides this, there are so many problems associated with like malnutrition, negligence, protection, poor health that make these children more vulnerable. TAABAR is running three-day care centers for these underprivileged children on following locations:

- 1. Sanpero Ki dhani
- 2. Bagariya Basti
- 3. Banjara Basti

We are taking care of these children's basic needs through following services

- Education
- Health and hygiene education
- · Art and craft, theatre and recreational activities
- Counselling services

Water shortage is another problem they face in their day-to-day life we are helping them by regular water supply in the community.

Teachers distributed clothes for the children in isolated communities. Children were counselled by the teachers to help them in dealing with this difficult situation.

Story of Hope

Hridesh was living with his parents and three younger brothers in his village. All younger brothers are studying and going to school but Hridesh left school after 7th class and went to his grandmother's home and started working with his cousin at his shop. Hridesh returned back to home after few days. Later, Akhtar (employer) sent his father to talk with Hridesh about working in Jaipur. After the meeting Hridesh came to Jaipur with him by bus and started making bangles after few days training. There were already some children working and four more children came after few days. Hridesh was working there from 8 AM to 11:30 PM.

Owner was providing food to children but the quality of food was very poor and unhygienic. Initially, 3000/- INR per month was decided as a salary but Hridesh had no idea about his payments. Every month, Hridesh was getting 50/- INR which he spent on buying gutkha and liquor. "As he said, his owner also used to consume alcohol sometimes."

"As he said, One day police raided our bangle making unit and rescued 9 children from three different places. At the beginning, we all were afraid of police but counselling session had reduced our stress. After that police took us to the police station and informed child welfare committee. In the mean time we all were given some food."

Child welfare committee transferred Hridesh to Bal Basera open shelter home and all medical formalities and documentation was followed by the shelter home during the admission. During the medical examination his platelet count was very low, later doctor suggested him a special diet plan (Kiwi, coconut water, Giloy Juice, Salad, fruits) which was followed in Bal Basera and improved his health.

As per the pre-test result teachers are providing him educational support to learn more about Hindi, English and Maths. Also, Hridesh was engaged by teachers in recreational classes as well as theatre class which increased his confidence and coping skills. Clean clothes, bedding, paste, brush, soap, stationery, oil, bag was provided to him for his daily uses.

Hridesh is friendly and happily living with other children in Bal Basera. He is in good health and learning more about health and hygiene in classes.

Story of Hope

Bjili is from Bihar and he was living with his family including mother, father and younger siblings in his village in Bihar. He has never been to school. The family was somehow surviving as his father was working on daily wages at brick kiln but from last 11 months, he has started behaving like a mentally retarded person because of that he lost his job as well and he was the only one working in the family. Because of that reason family fall in financial crisis and Bijli started looking for some work to support his family.

Meanwhile, an agent Akhtar contacted Bijli and proposed him to work in a bangle making unit in Jaipur. Later, Bijli and his mother agreed for this and he came to Jaipur with Akhtar.

Initially, the wages were decided 2000/- per month for that work but not received any payments. As he said, he was forced to work for long hours from 8 AM to 12:30 AM by employer. Many a time, he was not allowed to sleep until the work finished.

As he said, the food which is given to him was not good quality and he was not happy with the behaviour of his employer.

Suddenly, Police raided the bangle making unit on 8th December 2021 and rescued all the 9 children working in three different groups and arrested one supervisor but the employer was not there at that time. The whole scene was recorded by police but all the children got scared due to sudden raid as they had no idea what will happen next. Later, it was explained by the police to children that you all will be transferred to an open shelter home after the official formalities and shelter home will contact your families to reunite you with them. That information gave children a sense of trust. As Bijli said, after that we all proceed to the police station and statement was recorded by the police.

Child welfare committee transferred all the children to Bal Basera open shelter home for the temporary stay. All the procedure was followed by the COVID-19 guideline. Children were tested for the COVID and health checkups have been done within 24 hours of the admission in Bal Basera.

As he said, Bal Basera welcomed all of us and provided a kit which includes school bag, stationary, clothes, Paste, Oil, Toothbrush, and Comb to each child. Later, an orientation session was taken by the teachers in which they informed us about the educational, art & craft, theatre, music and other daily activities available for the children in Bal Basera. Teachers also informed children for the breakfast, lunch and dinner timings. After the pre-test teachers linked children with educational classes and extra curriculum activities.

Bijli has learned basic education, theatre, art & craft and music skills in Bal Basera. These activities rebuild the trust of children and give them a sense of security. Basic educational learning will help him to join a school after going back to home.

Healthcare and regular counselling sessions help him to cop up with the present situation and build his confidence for the better future.

At present, Bijli is living in Bal Basera and he is actively participating in all the activities. He likes theatre, drawing and dance classes. Bal Basera is in contact with his family and soon he will be reunited with them after the government order.
