The rehabilitation of rescued child laborers has been a central focus, involving a multifaceted approach to meet their immediate needs and promote their overall development. Our outreach initiatives have made a significant impact, with over 6,000 participants engaging in sessions on drug addiction, health education, and seasonal diseases. TAABAR'S PROFILE

In 2006, a heartwarming initiative took root with a mission to extend a lifeline to children living in the shadows of railway stations. These young souls, caught in the harsh reality of homelessness, were offered shelter, education on HIV/AIDS, and treatment for STIs. The journey began in a modest rented flat, where five children found a temporary haven. With time, the number of children under our care slowly increased.

In those early days, our resources were limited. We could only provide meals and a few precious hours of education and recreation. As dusk fell, it broke our hearts to send the children back to the station, knowing they faced the perils of prostitution, drug addiction, and trafficking - dark paths all too common in such circumstances.

Our unwavering dedication soon caught the attention of the government and the Jaipur Municipal Corporation. Impressed by our work, they offered us a hall near the Jaipur railway station. This space, now known as the "Bal Basera" shelter home, became a sanctuary for these vulnerable children, providing immediate lodging and the basic necessities of life.

The creation of Bal Basera was more than just a solution; it was a beacon of hope. Here, the children found not just shelter, but also the prospects essential for wholesome growth and development. The once temporary refuge transformed into a nurturing home, offering these young hearts a chance to dream, learn, and thrive. This is the story of Bal Basera - a testament to the power of compassion and the belief that every child deserves a chance at a brighter future.

Bal Basera Open Shelter Home: A Beacon of Hope for Vulnerable Children in Jaipur


Bal Basera continues to serve as a vital refuge for vulnerable children in Jaipur, a city grappling with child labor and street child issues. Under the Juvenile Justice Act 2015, our open shelter home has provided essential care and protection to children in dire need.

Key Achievements:

- 390 New Entrants: Over the past year, we welcomed 390 children, starting with 50 and ending the year with 55 in our care. On average, we nurtured 79 children per month.
- Comprehensive Services: Our holistic support included shelter, nutritious meals, clothing, bedding, medical care, educational support, and recreational activities such as theatre, dance, and art training.

Many children at Bal Basera come from traumatic backgrounds, including those trafficked from states like Bihar. We coordinate closely with government agencies to ensure their safety and provide a nurturing environment during the complex process of family reunification.

Our mission extends beyond temporary shelter; we aim to instill hope and empower these young lives to envision a brighter future. Bal Basera exemplifies the positive impact of community support for our most vulnerable members.













Bal Basera Children Home, Prem Nagar

TAABAR's Bal Basera Children's Home, established in 2015 and located in Prem Nagar on Agra Road, continues to be a sanctuary of hope and growth for children in need of care and protection. Operating under the Juvenile Justice Act, 2015, Bal Basera provides a long-term care environment where children can stay until they reach the age of 18, completing their education and receiving all necessary facilities to preserve their rights and well-being.

Since its inception, Bal Basera has seen three children successfully transition out of our care upon reaching adulthood. These young adults completed their education and received vocational training through the ICICI Foundation in courses such as marketing skills, medical care, and AC repair. Today, all three are employed in the private sector and continue their further studies with TAABAR's ongoing support and guidance.

Currently, Bal Basera is home to 21 children. Additionally, due to limited space in other facilities. we have also taken in rescued child laborers, offering them a safe and nurturing environment. Our holistic approach ensures that every child receives shelter, nutrition, clothing, medical care, education, and opportunities for personal and professional development.





Access to Health Care For Children

Mobile Medical Health & Counselling Van

Introduction: TAABAR launched a health project focused on providing information and counseling about STI/HIV/AIDS to street children. With support from railway authorities, we established a mobile tent clinic to deliver general health services to passengers, migrants, and street children.

Expansion of Services: Recognizing the prevalence of slums surrounding the railway station, we introduced the **TAABAR Mobile Clinic Van** to bring essential healthcare services directly to the communities, particularly focusing on children's health.


Day Care Centers: To prevent children from these slums from joining street life, we opened day care centers for neglected children and those from working families. These centers provide preschool education, after-school support, hobby classes, and theater activities, fostering a connection to formal education.

Medical Health and Counseling Van: Initially stationed at the railway station, the van offered free healthcare and medicines to passengers and street children. Discovering that many street children hailed from nearby slums, we expanded our reach to five slums in Jaipur, providing free medical services, referrals, health education, and HIV/AIDS awareness. Over 1,400 children have benefited from these services.

In 2023, we shifted our focus to a fully healthcare-centric approach. The mobile van now visits 26-30 slums in Jaipur, identifying children in need of medical attention, particularly those with congenital heart defects ("Blue Baby"). We ensure these children receive the surgeries and treatments they need, significantly improving their health outcomes.

TAABAR has made 10,708 referrals and provided guidance and counseling. TAABAR continues to support children with serious heart and other health conditions, ensuring they receive the necessary medical care and support.

To date, TAABAR has facilitated

- Heart surgeries (VSD closure): 3 children (2 boys, 1 girl)
- Hernia surgeries: 3 children (2 boys, 1 girl)
- Adeno-Tonsillitis surgery: 1 boy
- Breast lump surgery: 1 girl
- All children are aged 3-17 from very poor families, some of whom are migrants lacking the documentation needed for government schemes.

Challenges and Additional Efforts:

Many families are unaware of government schemes and lack the necessary documentation, presenting a significant challenge. The TAABAR team raises awareness about various government $schemes\ and\ assists\ families\ in\ obtaining\ the\ required\ documents.$















TAABAR Mobile Medical Health and Counselling Van for Girls

Overview: Launched in 2018, the TAABAR Mobile Clinic Van for Girls addresses healthcare disparities in slum areas by providing free, accessible medical services directly within communities. The initiative focuses on overcoming barriers to healthcare access for women and girls, offering medical consultations, treatments, and educational programs on health rights.

Impact: In the reporting period, the clinic served a total of 12,347 patients, including 12,207 girls under 18 and 140 adult women. Our personalized 1x1 counseling sessions empowered 1,236 girls to openly discuss their health concerns.



Health education has been integral to our mission, with 7,079 group sessions attended by 72,090 individuals. These sessions covered vital topics, including health issues, government schemes, and women's health. Additionally, at our day care centers, 900 sessions reached 18,000 children and their parents, while school programs educated 39,000 girls and teachers on menstrual hygiene and related health topics.

Referral services were critical, with patients referred for specialized care across several hospitals:

The **TAABAR** team not only facilitated these referrals but also provided follow-up support, ensuring patients received comprehensive care.

The TAABAR Mobile Clinic Van for Girls has made a profound impact on the health and well-being of underserved women and children. Through targeted healthcare interventions and education, we continue to empower our beneficiaries and foster healthier communities.

Women Training Center

The TAABAR Women Training Center has significantly impacted the lives of 111 women during the year 2023-24 by providing vocational training in Mehandi, Tailoring, and Beautician courses. Out of these, 57 women have started earning from their respective courses. Specifically, 42 women from the Mehandi course, 84 women from the Tailoring course, and 31 women from the Beautician course have achieved notable milestones. This includes employment in factories, opening boutiques and beauty parlours, and working as professionals in other parlours. In total, the center has facilitated 157 instances of women gaining employment or starting their own businesses. This comprehensive support not only enhances their employability and job retention but also builds their confidence, decision-making power, and overall social upliftment. Through awareness sessions and psycho-social support, TAABAR has empowered these women to live lives of dignity and respect, addressing their social, economic, and health issues comprehensively.









Many nomadic tribes and traditional castes, such as Snake Charmers, Banjaras, and Nats, endure harsh living conditions, remaining isolated and deprived of their rights. In Jaipur, the capital of Rajasthan, a substantial population of migrants from various parts of the country faces significant challenges in settling down.

TAABAR's Mobile Library Van program aims to integrate these marginalized communities into mainstream society by focusing on the education of their children. This innovative initiative visits eight different locations each week, bringing educational resources directly to those in need.

A dedicated teacher travels with the mobile library, providing fundamental academic instruction and assessing each child's academic level to tailor a personalized learning plan. Beyond just books, the Mobile Library Van offers a variety of engaging activities, including storytelling competitions, life skills training, games, art and craft sessions, theater, and festive celebrations.

The impact of the Mobile Library Van extends beyond primary education, supporting youths who lack the resources to purchase expensive books necessary for higher studies and job preparation. This holistic approach not only addresses immediate educational needs but also fosters a lifelong love for learning and personal development.

Since its inception, the Mobile Library Van has made a significant difference in the lives of children and youth in these communities. It has improved literacy rates, enhanced life skills, and provided a sense of inclusion and hope. By bringing education and resources directly to these underserved populations, TAABAR is helping to bridge the gap and pave the way for a brighter future.















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Isolated Communities



in 2023, TAABAR's efforts through its Health Care Centers and Mobile Library Van have significantly transformed the lives of disadvantaged children in Sanpero Ki Dhani, Bagariya Basti, and Banjara Basti. The centers have provided essential services, including education, health and hygiene education, arts and crafts, and counseling. This has led to healthier children, increased school enrollment, and a newfound love for learning and creative activities.

TAABAR has made significant strides in improving hygiene and access to clean water in the communities of Sanpero Ki Dhani, Bagariya Basti, and Banjara Basti. Hygiene kits, distributed regularly, include essentials like soap, toothbrushes, toothpaste, and sanitary napkins, promoting better personal hygiene practices among children and families.

Additionally, efforts to ensure a reliable water supply have alleviated water scarcity issues, fostering healthier living conditions. These initiatives, combined with health education sessions, have led to reduced incidences of illness, enhanced school attendance, and a cleaner, more aware community.

Through regular health check-ups and nutritional supplements, children's health has markedly improved. Awareness sessions on social issues like alcohol abuse and child marriage have shifted traditional beliefs, resulting in higher school attendance and more community involvement. Street plays and capacity-building activities have empowered children to become agents of change, advocating for better living conditions and educational opportunities.

One remarkable story is of a young girl named Meera from Bagariya Basti. Initially excluded from school due to her traditional attire and poor hygiene, Meera now excels in her studies and actively participates in theater and art sessions. Her transformation has inspired her peers and changed the attitudes of teachers and community members. Meera's journey from exclusion to empowerment exemplifies the profound impact of TAABAR's initiatives on individual lives and the broader community.

TAABAR operated eight Health Care Centers (formerly known as day care centers) in the slums of Jaipur, including Khor, Kagdiwara, three centers in isolated communities, Jhalana, and two centers in Luniyawas village. These centers provided early childhood education, nutritious meals, healthcare, hygiene, emotional and social support, and parental involvement. The primary goal was to prevent children from becoming part of street life in slums populated by daily wage laborers and migrants living in jhuggis, whose children often roam neglected.

From April 2023 to March 2024, more than 10000 children benefitted from these centers, They received education and healthcare, preschool education to facilitate enrollment in formal schools, along with nutrition and healthcare services. Community awareness sessions on drug addiction, health education, and seasonal diseases engaged over 6,000 participants, significantly impacting the community's well-being.

The donor supporting the Day Care Centers has shifted its focus from education to Access to healthcare for Children, prioritizing children with severe medical conditions such as "blue baby" syndrome, hernia, and breast lumps. Consequently, TAABAR's medical team will now work with a Mobile Van across more than 30 slum areas, addressing health education, girls' health, child protection, nutrition, and drug addiction. This strategic transition aims to provide critical healthcare support to children whose families cannot afford the necessary medical expenses, ensuring comprehensive care and protection for the most vulnerable.















Child-Friendly Center for Psycho-Social Support







Overview: TAABAR's Child-Friendly Center, located at Shastri Nagar Police Station, provides crucial psycho-social support for children at the immediate rescue stage. This center plays a pivotal role in helping children relax, build trust, and share their experiences, which is essential for their recovery and protection.

Psycho-Social Support Framework: Our approach unfolds in three distinct stages:

- 1. Immediate Rescue: Upon arrival, children's basic needs-food, water, and clothing-are promptly met. Psycho-social first aid is provided to alleviate anxiety and foster trust. Counselors engage in comforting activities, encouraging children to express their experiences and begin their healing journey.
- 2. Healing and Transition: Once admitted to the Child Care Institution (CCI), children participate in specialized activities and counseling designed to address trauma related to their rescue and legal processes. This phase prepares them emotionally for judicial proceedings and facilitates their transition to a stable environment.
- 3. Testimony and Long-Term Care: Continuous support and counseling are provided as children offer testimony and navigate the legal system. This phase focuses on creating a secure environment, ensuring that children receive the long-term care necessary to rebuild their lives. Significance of Psycho-Social Support:
- Accurate Reporting: Enhances the reliability of information and evidence, strengthening FIRs and supporting legal actions.
- Increased Convictions: Addresses common challenges like inadequate information, leading to improved chances of securing convictions. (24 conviction)
- Addressing Manipulation: Mitigates fear and manipulation, reducing the risk of false statements.

Conclusion: The Child-Friendly Center is essential in providing holistic support for child laborers during their recovery journey. Through targeted psycho-social interventions, TAABAR empowers these children, facilitating their healing and reintegration into society.

Post-Rescue and Rehabilitation of Child Laborers

The post-rescue rehabilitation of child laborers involves a comprehensive and compassionate approach. Initially, the focus is on meeting their immediate needs such as food, shelter, clothing, bedding, and toiletries. Concurrently, psycho-social support is provided to help children process their traumatic experiences.

Legal steps are taken to safeguard their rights, including recording statements, setting up bank accounts, and obtaining Aadhar cards. The process also encompasses preparing files for compensation claims, conducting thorough medical check-ups, and providing necessary treatments. Rehabilitation efforts extend to fostering holistic development, which includes addressing nutritional needs and promoting education. Engagement in informal learning, recreational activities, and artistic pursuits-such as theater, dance, computer classes, and art therapy-plays a crucial role. Additionally, organized picnics, exposure trips, and celebratory events like birthdays enhance their emotional well-being.

For children who were previously missing, had run away, or faced adverse conditions, the aim is to restore their sense of security and stability. This involves collaborating with agencies such as Child Welfare Committees, District Child Protection Units, Railway authorities, and Bihar DCPU to either reunite them with their families or find appropriate alternative care. Ongoing followup, including home visits and detailed digital case management, underscores our commitment to ensuring their continued safety and well-being.









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Education for Female Sex Worker's Children





The "Education for Female Sex Workers' Children" project, implemented from June to November 2023 in Jaipur, made significant strides in addressing the challenges faced by over 104 children of Female Sex Workers (FSWs) 64 boys and 40 girls up to the age of 18. The initiative aimed to break the cycle of exploitation by providing education, healthcare, vocational training, and raising awareness about social rights. Engaging the FSW community in project planning fostered a supportive environment and facilitated the identification of eligible participants for government schemes, promoting integration into mainstream society.

Community awareness initiatives addressed the social stigma faced by these children in mainstream schools, leading to increased support and a smoother transition into formal schooling. As a result, 104 children were enrolled in formal education, alongside preschool readiness programs that enhanced foundational literacy and numeracy skills for those who had never attended school. Taabar's psychosocial counseling yielded positive outcomes, including improved mental health, self-perception, decision-making abilities, and awareness of education and healthcare. Vocational training initiatives equipped children with practical skills, boosting their employability and entrepreneurial potential. Additionally, efforts to improve documentation access enabled families to benefit from various government welfare schemes.

Overall, these comprehensive interventions significantly transformed the lives of individuals and the broader community, promoting resilience, education, and well-being, while uplifting families from extreme poverty and empowering them toward a better future.

Success Stories



Kusum - Rescuing from the Shadows of Exploitation

Kusum, a girl living in Chainpura Basti in Jaipur, faces challenging circumstances at home. Her family's economic condition is far from ideal, living in a makeshift house where every rainstorm poses a struggle. Upon visiting Kusum's home, it was observed that most women in her family were standing outside, calling customers. When we spoke to Kusum's father, he revealed that Kusum, at the age of 16, was supposed to get married. While a groom was arranged, Kusum refused to marry, stating that marriages here often lead to girls being sold.

After a few days, we revisited Kusum's home along with other girls from the area. These girls were enrolled in educational programs by the organization, and now they are pursuing their studies. Some are even learning professional skills like beauty parlour work. Through these girls, Kusum's father was convinced, and he realized that with the help of the organization, his daughter could



receive an education and learn skills to earn a livelihood. Consequently, Kusum was admitted to a telecommunication course in the city, where she is developing an interest in accountancy.



Success Stories



Rakhi's Journey: Empowering Dreams Against All Odds"

Rakhi, a girl residing in the rice fields of Shivdas Pura on Agra Road in Jaipur, is 16 years old. Her parents passed away during her childhood, and she now lives with her uncle and aunt. She is a quiet and composed girl. When we met her, she mentioned that apart from her uncle and aunt, there was no one else in her family. She has two brothers and three elder sisters, but they are step-siblings. She studied up to the eighth grade, but her stepbrothers discontinued her education. They told her to stop studying and work at home so that customers would come.

She expressed her unwillingness, stating that she wanted to study and work. When the organization visited her home and spoke to her uncle, he angrily refused, saying that girls here don't study; they take care of the house after marriage. He suggested not to waste time working hard unnecessarily. However, after a few days, we went back to her house and again spoke to her uncle. This time, though still upset, he agreed, saying, "Alright, take Rakhi and get her educated. But if she doesn't progress, I will marry her off."

The organization immediately enrolled her in a school and connected her with AISECT Academy, where she is learning a beauty parlor course. Today, she serves as an example in the entire neighborhood. She does makeup for other women at home, and everyone in the community is happy. Now, she has also started her own business, and other girls in the neighborhood are joining us.


Official Visits

- 1. On 27th April 2023, a team from the Child Welfare Committee (CWC), including Ms. Shanti Bhatnagar, Mr. Nijam Mohammad, Mr. Ram Niwas Saini, and Ms. Shimla Kumawat, conducted an inspection of the Children's Home in Prem Nagar. During the visit, 23 children were present and discussions were held about their education and schooling. The children performed a drama on stopping child labor, which was well received. The institution was found to have a good environment with clean and airy rooms, and the children's smiles were noted as a positive sign.
- 2. On 16th May 2023, Ms. Anita Muval, Assistant Director of the District Child Protection Unit (DCPU), inspected a children's home. During the inspection, 22 children were absent, with 18 being taught by teachers and 4 working on computers. The cleanliness of the facility was satisfactory, and the children were found to be engaged in conversation and enjoying a meal of pulses, rice, and chapatti. Instructions were given to prepare for the upcoming rainy season and ensure proper arrangements for coolers.
- On 17th May 2023, Ms. Anita Muwal from DCPU and Mr. Gourav Sharma from DCPU conducted an inspection of the Bal Basera Open Shelter Home. They found that all arrangements were in good condition and commended the dedicated team at Bal Basera.
- 4. On 15th June 2023, Ms. Anita Muval, Assistant Director of DCPU, conducted routine inspection. This visit included the conversations with the children. The organization's efforts were found to be satisfactory.
- 5. On 1st July 2023, Shila Saini, President of CWC, along with CWC members Ms. Shanti Bhatnagar, Mr. Nijam Mohammad, Mr. Ram Niwas Saini, and Ms. Shimla Kumawat, inspected a children's home. The inspection noted that 20 children resided there. Observations included the food menu, which featured aloo paratha and mint chasi pulses, and cleanliness was found to be satisfactory.
- 6. On 8th July 2024, CWC Members Ms Shanti Bhatnagar, Mr. Nijam Mohammad, Mr. Ram Niwas Saini, and Ms. Shimla Kumawat inspected the Bal Basera Open Shelter home. They interacted with the children, who were all engaged in their classes and appeared happy. The team noted that all arrangements were running smoothly and wished the children well.
- 7. On 28th July 2023, the member of District Level Inspection Committee Ms Anita Muwal from DCPU, along with Vijay Sharma and Dr. Shahina Parveen, conducted an inspection. They found that all arrangements were satisfactory.
- 8. On 9th August 2023, the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) Jaipur, led by Members Shanti Bhatnagar, Mr. Nijam Mohammad, Mr. Ram Niwas Saini, and Ms. Shimla Kumawat, inspected the home. They noted and appreciated that the children were actively engaged in craft work.
- 9. On 15th August 2023, Sanjay Jain from the Chief Minister's Office visited the Bal Basera Open Shelter Home. He found that overall, all activities were excellent and wonderful, and he wished everyone the best of luck for the future.





- 10. On 19th August 2023, Mr. Vimal Mishra from Mahindra World City visited the Bal Basera Open Shelter Home. He commended the excellent activities and good conditions and wished everyone well.
- 11. On 29th August 2023, Mr. Satish Chandra Godara, Additional District Judge No.1 from Jaipur Metro, visited the Bal Basera Open Shelter Home. He found the organization very well organized with good hygienic conditions.
- 12. On 31st August 2023, Ms. Anita Muwal from DCPU conducted an inspection. At the time of the inspection, there were 24 children present, and all arrangements were found to be good.
- 13. On 7th September 2023, Members of Child Welfare Committee Jaipur Ms. Shanti Bhatnagar, Mr. Nijam Mohammad, Mr. Ram Niwas Saini, and Ms. Shimla Kumawat, inspected the home. They also celebrated the birth anniversary of Krishna with the children, and found all arrangements to be satisfactory.
- 14. On 27th September 2023, Mr. Vikram Singh Bhati, Secretary of DLSA Metro II, conducted an inspection. He found that the conditions were good.
- 15. On 29th September 2023, Members of Child Welfare Committee Jaipur, Ms. Shanti Bhatnagar, Mr. Nijam Mohammad, Mr. Ram Niwas Saini, and Ms. Shimla Kumawat, conducted a monthly routine inspection of Bal Basera Open Shelter Home. They found all arrangements to be satisfactory.
- 16. On 25th October 2023, Members of Child Welfare Committee Ms. Shanti Bhatnagar, Mr. Nijam Mohammad, Mr. Ram Niwas Saini, and Ms. Shimla Kumawat, visited to see the children who were going to Bihar. All 23 children had been rescued from child labour and had to stay because legal formalities take 3-4 months to complete. After this period, officers from Bihar came to take them. Rescued children placed in other homes were also leaving by the same train under the supervision of the repatriation committee, which included representatives of shelter and children's homes, as well as escort police. The CWC members interacted with the children, who happily mentioned they had milk, apples, and breakfast, and were all healthy.
- 17. On 14th November 2023, Members of Child Welfare Committee Ms. Shanti Bhatnagar, Mr. Nijam Mohammad, Mr. Ram Niwas Saini, and Ms Shimla Kumawat conducted r inspection of Bal Basera Open Shelter Home. They found all the children happy and healthy and they extended Diwali and New Year wishes to them.
- 18. On 16th November 2023, Ms. Anita Muwal from DCPU conducted an inspection of Bal Basera Open Shelter Home. She found that there were 38 children present, and all arrangements were good.
- 19. On 15th November 2023, the CWC team, including President Shila Saini, Ms. Shanti Bhatnagar, Mr. Nijam Mohammad, Mr. Ram Niwas Saini, and Ms. Shimla Kumawat, visited Bal Basra Children's Home. The inspection team found 21 children present, happy after celebrating Diwali. The children were focused on their studies due to upcoming exams and were provided with breakfast and lunch according to the diet chart. The overall cleanliness and arrangements were praised.



- 20. On 30th November 2023, Mr. Vikram Singh Bhati, Secretary of DLSA Metro II, conducted sudden inspection. He found the conditions to be good.
- 21. On 7th December 2023, Ms. Anita Muval, Assistant Director of DCPU conducted a surprise inspection of Bal Basera Children Home. The visit noted that 21 children were present, with 18 attending school. The cleanliness and facilities were found to be adequate, and the children appeared satisfied.
- 22. On 9th December 2023, CWC Chairperson Ms. Sheela Saini along with members Ms. Shanti Bhatnagar, Mr. Nijam Mohammad, Mr. Ram Niwas Saini, and Ms. Shimla Kumawat conducted an inspection. They found all children healthy and noted that all arrangements were running smoothly.
- 23. On 14th December 2023, Mr. Samrendra Singh, Secretary of District Legal Services Authority (DLSA) Jaipur, Metro First, inspected Bal Basera Children's Home. The inspection found 21 children present, and the institution's environment and cleanliness were noted as very good.
- 24. On 13th January 2024, CWC Chairperson Ms. Sheela Saini along with members Ms. Shanti Bhatnagar, Mr. Nijam Mohammad, Mr. Ram Niwas Saini, and Ms Shimla Kumawat conducted routine inspection. They noted that the children's Aadhaar cards were being discussed and that the children had their weekly tests on that day.
- 25. On 5th February 2024, Ms. Anita Muval, Assistant Director of DCPU, conducted an inspection of Bal Basera Children Home in Prem Nagar. She recorded 55 children in attendance, with 33 attending school. The inspection included checking the medical box, which was well-stocked, and fire extinguishers, which were up to date. The children were served rice, aloo, and raita for dinner, and engaged in indoor and outdoor games, yoga, and dance classes.
- 26. On 28th February 2024, Mr. Satish Chandra Godana, ADJ-01 from Jaipur Metro II, conducted an inspection of Bal Basera Open Shelter Home. He found that cleanliness was adequate, and all arrangements were satisfactory. He also noted that the staff was taking good care of the children.
- 27. On 2nd March 2024, CWC Chairperson Ms. Sheela Saini, along with members Ms. Shanti Bhatnagar, Mr. Nijam Mohammad, Mr. Ram Niwas Saini, and Ms. Shimla Kumawat conducted an inspection. They found 34 children present and advised care taker to take care of seasonal illnesses.
- 28. On 13th March 2024, Mr. L.L. Paharia visited the Bal Basera Open Shelter Home. He observed that the rescued children were protected and enjoying different types of activities along with receiving education.
- 29. On 13th March 2024, Shila Saini, President of CWC, along with CWC members Ms. Shanti Bhatnagar, Mr. Nijam Mohammad, Mr. Ram Niwas Saini, and Ms Shimla Kumawat, visited a Bal Basera Children Home, Prem Nagar, Jaipur. The medical box was checked and found well-stocked, and the children were served rice, aloo, and raita for dinner. The children regularly participated in indoor and outdoor games, yoga, and dance classes, and the entertainment arrangements were deemed satisfactory.

Tales of Bal Basera Open Shelter Home

Case Study: The Rehabilitation Journey of Tarun





Tarun in Medical Room at Bal Basera Shelter home

Background: Tarun, a 14-year-old from Fatehabad, Haryana, fled his home due to domestic issues and ended up living on the streets. His daily life was marked by challenges and hardships.

Crisis Point: Tarun's plight worsened when he suffered a severe leg injury at a railway station, rendering him immobile and in immense pain. He was subsequently admitted to Bal Basera Open Shelter Home by the Child Welfare Committee.

Medical Intervention: Upon admission, TAABAR Society's medical team conducted X-rays and determined that surgery was necessary for Tarun's fractured leg. The surgery was successful, and he underwent a structured rehabilitation program, including physiotherapy, nutritious meals, and hygiene care.

Family Tracing and Reunion: During Tarun's medical treatment, TAABAR Society staff worked diligently to locate his family. Through collaboration with local authorities and community members, they established contact and initiated a careful mediation and counseling process. This led to a gradual and safe reunion with his family.

Outcome: Tarun's case demonstrates the transformative power of coordinated intervention and compassionate care for vulnerable street children. Through the efforts of TAABAR Society and the Child Welfare Committee, Tarun not only regained his physical health but also achieved emotional and social reintegration into his family and community.

Conclusion: Tarun's journey underscores the critical importance of comprehensive support systems for street children. The dedicated efforts of TAABAR Society and the Child Welfare Committee turned a situation of despair into one of hope and recovery, showcasing the profound impact of their work on vulnerable lives.

Rescue and Rehabilitation of Indal and Karan

Incident Overview

On June 5, 2024, Indal (16) and Karan (14) were rescued from child labor by Bhatt Basti Police Station in Bihar. Their employer, attempting to evade the police, instructed them to jump off a roof, causing severe burns to their feet upon landing on hot sand. The police arrested the employer and took the boys into their care.

Shelter and Medical Care

Following the Child Welfare Committee's order, the boys were admitted to Bal Basera Shelter Home. They received immediate medical attention for their burns and were assisted by staff due to their inability to walk.

Boys' Testimony:

Upon arrival, Indal and Karan shared their harrowing experiences:

- 1. Initially treated well, they were later abused, beaten, and denied food by their employer.
- 2. They were threatened, forced to meet daily work targets, and locked in a room most of the time.
- 3. Their wages were withheld, and no money was sent to their families.

Rescue Operation

A tip-off led the police to their workplace. Upon the police's arrival, the employer instructed the boys to jump off the roof, resulting in their injuries. The police reassured the boys of their safety and brought them to Bal Basera.





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Rehabilitation Process

- 1. Medical Treatment: The boys received regular care, bandage changes, and a physicianplanned diet.
- 2. Counseling: Regular counseling sessions helped them overcome their fear.
- 3. Recovery: With nutritious food, medication, and regular check-ups, the boys healed quickly. Staff assisted their mobility during recovery.

Current Status

Indal and Karan have fully recovered and now live at the shelter, engaged in studying, dancing, acting, and craft-making. They feel safe and secure and have given statements to the police, seeking justice against their employer.

Conclusion: Indal and Karan's story highlights the importance of rescue and rehabilitation efforts for child labor victims. The dedicated efforts of the Bhatt Basti Police and Bal Basera Shelter Home have transformed their lives, providing them with safety, care, and a chance to rebuild their futures.

Healthcare on the Move: Inspiring Success Stories

A Miracle for Baby Yogita: A Journey of Hope and Healing

Background:

Baby Yogita Saini, a four-year-old girl from Tela Kuwa, underwent life-saving surgery for Tetralogy of Fallot (TOF) on April 16, 2024. Her parents, Raju and Anita Saini, faced immense financial hardship as laborers, struggling to provide for their three daughters and secure necessary medical care.

Initial Visit:

Yogita, showing signs of severe cyanosis and difficulty breathing, was brought to the TAABAR Mobile Clinic by her desperate father. The initial treatment and referral to a higher center were crucial as her condition had been worsening despite previous medical visits and attempts.



The TAABAR team facilitated her transfer to CKS Hospital, where she was admitted on April 14, 2024. Tests confirmed the urgent need for surgery. Despite the complexity and high risks associated with her condition, the operation was scheduled for April 16, 2024.





The Operation:

On the day of the surgery, the tension was palpable. The family, overcome with emotion, prayed fervently for Yogita's survival. The surgery, which lasted about 6-8 hours, was completed successfully. The relief and joy were immense when the doctors delivered the news of success around 3:00 PM.

Recovery and Gratitude:

Yogita awoke in the ICU on April 17, 2024, bringing tears of joy to her parents and the medical team. Her family expressed profound gratitude to the TAABAR Society and all involved, acknowledging that the operation, which they could not have afforded, was a miracle facilitated by the kindness and generosity of others.

Thank You Letter:

The Saini family, overwhelmed with gratitude, shared their heartfelt thanks, recognizing the incredible support that made their daughter's recovery possible. They expressed their enduring appreciation for the selfless help that turned their darkest days into a beacon of hope and healing.

Urgent Hernia Surgery for 8-Year-Old Kunal

Background:
Kunal, an 8-year-old from the Khor slum area, lives with his family under challenging Kunal, an 8-year-old from the kine Ropal Lal, works as a laborer, and his mother, Pooja, is a housewife. Their financial limitations have made accessing adequate healthcare difficult.

Initial Concerns:

Kunal arrived at the Multi Mobile Clinic Van with severe symptoms: high fever, lower abdominal pain, and a reducible swelling in the scrotal region. The TAABAR medical team, including Dr. Veerendra Singh, suspected an inguinal hernia after a physical exam and recommended an ultrasonography for confirmation.

Diagnosis and Socioeconomic Constraints:

The ultrasonography confirmed a left inguinal hernia. Despite previous diagnoses, the condition had worsened over a month. Kunal's family, lacking health insurance and financial resources, struggled to afford the required surgery.

Referral and Surgery:

TAABAR referred Kunal to a higher medical center, where Laparoscopic Inguinal Herniotomy was deemed necessary. After obtaining donor approval, Kunal was admitted to CKS Hospital on April 16, 2024. The laparoscopic procedure was successful, involving minimal-access surgery to correct the hernia.

Recovery and Follow-Up:

Kunal's post-surgery recovery was smooth. He was monitored in the ICU and gradually progressed from a liquid to a semi-solid diet. Discharged in stable condition, his parents received detailed care instructions and emergency contact information.

Gratitude:






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Vishal's Journey: A Story of Hope and Resilience





Background:

Vishal, a 14-year-old boy from Kagadiwada Center, faced a dire health challenge with a ventricular septal defect (VSD). His parents, Ashok and Hemlata Kumar, both laborers, struggled financially while coping with their son's severe condition. They had already lost an elder son to a similar heart defect due to lack of treatment.

A Ray of Hope:

During a visit from the TAABAR Mobile Clinic on March 16, 2024, Vishal, initially silent and hopeful, revealed his heartbreaking struggle with his congenital heart defect. His parents, unable to afford treatment, had been overwhelmed with grief after their elder son's death and feared losing Vishal as well. Vishal's plea for help was met with compassion from the health educator, who promised to assist them in getting the necessary treatment.

Financial Struggles:

The Kumar family's financial situation was bleak, with their meager earnings barely covering daily expenses and previous medical debts. Their lack of health insurance and government support made accessing treatment even more challenging. Vishal's deteriorating health only compounded their despair.

Path to Treatment:

On March 27, 2024, Vishal was taken to CKS Hospital for tests, confirming that a VSD device closure surgery was necessary. With the TAABAR organization covering all costs, Vishal's surgery was scheduled for March 28, 2024. The family's anxiety was palpable, but they found solace in the support and promises of the organization.

The Surgery:

On the morning of March 28, Vishal was admitted for surgery, and his family fasted and prayed for his recovery. The surgery, lasting a few hours, was a moment of high tension for the family, given their previous loss. When the doctors announced the success of the operation, tears of joy and gratitude flowed freely. Vishal's parents expressed profound relief and thanks, recognizing the gift of life given to their son.

Recovery and Discharge:

Vishal's surgery was successful, and he was monitored in the ICU before being transferred to the ward. His recovery was closely observed, and he was discharged on March 29, 2024, feeling much better. The family was given post-surgery instructions and advised to return for a followup.

Gratitude:

The Kumar family, deeply moved by the support they received, expressed heartfelt thanks to the TAABAR Society and all involved. They were overwhelmed with gratitude for the chance to see their son live a fuller life and were grateful for the second chance they had been given. Vishal's journey, marked by hardship and hope, culminated in a new beginning, made possible by the compassion and dedication of those who supported him.

Hope Restored: Baby Manvi's Battle with Inguinal Hernia





Background:

Baby Manvi, a 3-year-old from Shikariyo Ki Dandi, lives with her laborer father Vikas, housewife mother Neetu, and one sibling. Despite their financial struggles, they strive to care for their children.

Initial Visit:

Manvi was brought to the Multi Mobile Clinic Van with symptoms including fever, severe lower abdominal pain, and inguinal swelling. TAABAR's nursing staff provided initial treatment, and Dr. Veerendra Singh suspected an inguinal hernia. An ultrasonography confirmed this diagnosis.

Medical Process:

Following the diagnosis, Manvi was referred to a higher center. A donor-approved file, including medical records and a hospital quotation, facilitated her surgery. Investigations included ultrasonography and various blood tests.

Surgery and Recovery:

On April 6, 2024, Manvi underwent a successful laparoscopic hernia repair at CKS Hospital. Postsurgery, she was monitored in the ICU, where she quickly stabilized and transitioned from a liquid to a semi-solid diet. She was discharged on April 7, 2024, with instructions for follow-up care.

Gratitude:

Manvi's family is deeply grateful to the TAABAR Society Team, the donor, and the CKS Hospital staff for their support and for saving Manvi's life. Their assistance was invaluable in providing the medical care they could not afford.



A Life Saved: Master Priyanshu's Journey from **Chronic Tonsillitis to Recovery**





Master Priyanshu, an 11-year-old from Kagdiwada (VKI) slum, lives with his laborer father Dharmpal and seven other family members. After presenting symptoms of recurrent colds, throat pain, and difficulty breathing, he was brought to the Multi Mobile Clinic Van.

Initial Visit:

Priyanshu, accompanied by a health educator, received initial treatment and an OPD prescription from the TAABAR nursing team. Dr. Veerendra Singh diagnosed him with chronic tonsillitis, necessitating further examination and surgery.

Diagnosis and Surgery:

A nasal endoscopy confirmed 4th-grade adeno-tonsillitis. Urgent surgery was required, and donor approval was secured. Priyanshu underwent an adenotonsillectomy using coblation technology at S.S. Multi-speciality Hospital on April 19, 2024.

Recovery and Discharge:

Post-surgery, Priyanshu was monitored in the ICU, regaining consciousness and progressing from a liquid to a semi-solid diet within 12 hours. He was discharged on April 20, 2024, with recovery instructions.

Gratitude:

Priyanshu's family extends deep thanks to the TAABAR Society, the donor, and S.S. Multispeciality Hospital staff for their life-saving support and exceptional care.

Aashish's Hernia Surgery: A Journey to Recovery



Background:

Master Aashish, a 5-year-old from VKI slum, lives with his laborer father Dharmveer and his mother Neetu. He presented with high fever, lower abdominal pain, and swelling in the left scrotal region.

Visit to Mobile Clinic:

Aashish, brought by a health educator, was examined by Dr. Veerendra Singh at the Multi Mobile ${\it Clinic\,Van.\,Diagnosed\,with\,a\,left\,inguino-scrotal\,hernia, he\,was\,referred\,for\,further\,treatment.}$

Diagnosis and Surgery:

Ultrasonography confirmed the hernia. After obtaining donor approval, Aashish was admitted to CKS Hospital on April 18, 2024, for laparoscopic inguinal herniotomy scheduled for April 19, 2024.

Recovery and Discharge:

Post-surgery, Aashish was observed in the ICU and showed steady recovery. He regained consciousness within 2-4 hours, transitioned to a semi-solid diet, and was discharged on April 20, 2024.
